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INTRODUCTION

Emily Griffith Technical College (EGTC) provides for the safety and security of all members of its campus community. EGTC believes that academic freedom can only flourish in an environment that is free of criminal or other disruptive activity and unsafe conditions. The College is committed to maintaining the campus community as a place of study and work that is free from abuse, intimidation and harassment and where everyone is treated with respect and courtesy. The College will not tolerate criminal activity and will actively pursue internal discipline, criminal prosecution, or both, for all offenders.

EGTC is governed by the Denver Public Schools (DPS) Board of Education and by regulations established by the Colorado Community College System. Located primarily at 1860 Lincoln Street, Denver with two other locations at 200 E. 9th Street and 1205 Osage Street in Denver. The EGTC Campuses do not have any residential housing. EGTC has approximately 7,000 students annually and 220 faculty and staff on three campuses.

On October 1st of each year, EGTC Campus Security publishes a new Annual Security Report (ASR). The ASR is created for the previous calendar year. A paper copy of the Annual Security Report for all campuses is available upon request at 1860 Lincoln Street Campus. Similar to the daily crime log, anyone may request a hardcopy of the ASR from EGTC Security Department and receive their copy within two business days.

CAMPUS SECURITY

EGTC's security officers have the authority to ask a person for identification and to determine whether an individual has lawful business at EGTC. Security officers do not possess arrest power. Criminal incidents are referred to the local police. The College works with police from Denver to provide a safe and secure environment for members of the campus community. Denver police officers have the authority to enforce federal, state, and local laws. The Denver Police Department maintains close relations with all federal, state, and local law enforcement entities. Criminal cases are filed in the Denver Municipal Courts.

REPORTING OF CRIMINAL ACTIVITIES OR EMERGENCIES

EGTC works closely with the Denver Police Department. Administrative offices are located at 1566 N. Washington Street, Denver, CO. The Departments have officers available 24 hours a day and the Departments can be reached by calling (720-913-2800) or 911 for emergencies. EGTC Security officers have portable radios

with a direct line to Denver Police. The Denver Police department responds to all campus incidents reported by students, faculty, staff, and members of the general public. Emergency response for fire, ambulance, or hazardous materials is the joint responsibility of the Denver Fire Department and the Denver Police Department.

TO REPORT A CRIME OR EMERGENCY

Students, staff, and visitors should promptly report criminal incidents, accidents, and other emergencies to the Denver Police Department by dialing 911. Individuals may also report incidents in person at the campus security office located in the main lobby on the first floor at 1860 Lincoln Street. Members of the campus community are encouraged to report any activity, situation, or conduct that disrupts, adversely affects, or interferes with the function of the College and the pursuit of its educational purpose.

CAMPUS SECURITY AUTHORITIES (CSAs)

The definition of “Campus Security Authority,” according to federal law, is as follows: “An official of an institution who has significant responsibility for student and campus activities, including, but not limited to, student discipline and campus judicial proceedings.”

The abovementioned CSAs will report the criminal activity to EGTC Security to be included in this report.

ANONYMOUSLY REPORTING CRIMES

Individuals may report crimes and crime tips anonymously through Safe2Tell. The phone line is not recorded and has no caller ID. In Colorado Safe2Tell reporting parties are anonymous under the State Law. Please remember that details are critical to an effect intervention. Please note that this is not an emergency reporting system. DIAL 911 FOR EMERGENCY SITUATIONS! The number for Safe2Tell is 1-877-542-SAFE (7233).

For the purposes of making timely warnings and annual statistical disclosures, a voluntary confidential report of a crime can be made to any CSA by any person directly associated with the college.

The college employs no professional or pastoral counselors but does provide victims to contact <http://www.unitedwaydenver.org> if a professional counselor is required. These counselors are not campus security authorities but the College encourages them to ask persons that they are counseling to report crimes on a voluntary, confidential basis for inclusion in the annual crime statistics.

MANDATORY AND REPORTING OF CRIMINAL ACTIVITY OFF-CAMPUS

If an off-campus crime occurs involving an individual affiliated with EGTC, the crime will be reported to the appropriate agencies, though due to the location, it will not be counted as a [Clery Act](#) crime for the institution.

TIMELY WARNINGS

There are multiple circumstances in which a Timely Warning will be issued by EGTC. Any condition or incident that could compromise the safety and well-being of any member of the EGTC community will result in an appropriate timely warning being issued. Once the institution receives necessary and pertinent information, it will be sent through the emergency notification system. The message will be crafted in order to afford the campus community with information that allows them to take the needed precautions to protect themselves. The warning will be communicated to the Emily Griffith Campus in one or more of the following ways: e-mail, emergency text and a message on the college's website. The Executive Director, the Department of Safety and Security DPS, or the Director of Student Services will issue the warning.

Depending on the particular circumstances of the condition or incident, especially in all situations that could pose an immediate threat to the community and individuals, the Department of Safety and Security DPS may send a Ready Ops text message or email directly to leadership, providing the college community with additional immediate notification. The electronic bulletin is immediately accessible via computer by all faculty, staff and students.

EMERGENCY RESPONSE AND EVACUATION PROCEDURE

Alert Channels

In the case of an emergency, students, faculty, and staff will be notified through the following channels:

- Intercom system
- Text messages
- Voicemail
- EGTC Email

The content and initiation of the notification system may come from DPS Central Dispatch or be determined by the EGTC's Executive Director, or his /her designee. The emergency notification system may be initiated only at the direction of the Executive Director, or his /her designee, to include DPS Safety and Security Central Dispatch unless the Denver Police Department has determined that an imminent threat requiring immediate action is posed to the campus community.

In the event that an incident affects only one campus, staff at the unaffected campus will not receive the message. However, in situations where it is necessary to alert students, all will be notified, regardless of the emergency, regardless of their location.

SECURITY AND ACCESS TO CAMPUS FACILITIES

At the main campus located at 1860 Lincoln Street, Denver, CO, EGTC paid staff and students participating in extended occupational or educational programs are issued a white access cards with the exception of Continuing Education students. These cards are to gain access through the turnstiles located at the first floor lobby. For everyone else, EGTC's security officers have the authority to ask a person for identification and to determine whether an individual has lawful business at EGTC. Security is on site during business hours: M-F 6 a.m. – 10:00 p.m. and Saturdays, 7:00 a.m. – 3:00 p.m. The front doors are locked M-F after 8:00 p.m. so people cannot enter the building. During the traditional school year an Administrative Security Officer is on site in the afternoon and evening hours Monday through Thursday and on Saturday from 7:00am through 3:30pm when 1205 Osage Street opens. At the CLA campus on 9th Street there is an onsite Campus Security Officer, primarily for the High School. This Officer is there through the traditional school year Monday through Friday.

MAINTENANCE SECURITY

All mechanical problems that could cause physical harm to the public or members of the campus community are given priority. Facilities personnel may be contacted through 720-423-2003. EGTC incorporates environmental security design practices in the planning, building and maintenance stages of all physical structures and grounds that are part of EGTC's campuses. Lighting and visual blockage surveys are conducted on an as-needed basis by facilities staff, and inadequacies are corrected as soon as practicable.

RESPONSIBILITY FOR PREPARATION OF THIS REPORT

EGTC's Security Department, in collaboration with the Denver Police Department collects crime statistics that occur on and near the campus. Once a year the EGTC Security Department compiles and classifies all of the statistics pertinent to the Clery Act for the purpose of making this report.

ANNUAL DRILLS AND EXERCISES

The stairwells and exit doors throughout the building are marked with illuminated green exit signs. Should the fire alarm sound, all staff and visitors will need to exit the building via one of the two building stairwells and proceed either south on Lincoln Street or west on 19th Avenue. Everyone must be at least 100 feet from the building.

EGTC will have a fire drill 1-2 times per year. During a drill, only the floor where the alarm is activated plus the ones immediately above and below must evacuate. During a drill, strobes and sirens will be triggered. Elevators will not work during a drill or a real situation. Staging for those unable to take the stairs should go to the elevator lobby on their floor. On a yellow sign, there is a red button to be pushed to alert security and provide personal information so the necessary attention and assistance can be provided. At the 1205 Osage and CLA Campuses there is an Emergency Preparedness Manual on site with emergency procedures.

POSSESSION OF FIREARMS/WEAPONS ON CAMPUS

Security, Please review to see if this is accurate information

State Board for community colleges and occupational education (SBCCOE) states that no person may have on his or her person any unauthorized firearm, ammunition, explosive device, or illegal weapon on campus or any facility used by a college. Persons authorized to carry firearms and other equipment defined in the policy are:

1. Those persons conducting and participating in an approved program of instruction in the college's curriculum which requires access to such equipment as an integral part of the instructional program;
2. Certified peace officers;
3. Those persons who have been issued a valid permit to carry a concealed handgun in accordance with Colorado's Concealed Carry Act, C.R.S. § 18-12-201, et seq. and who are acting in compliance with the requirements of that Act; and
4. Those persons granted permission at the discretion of the college president for specific purposes from time to time.

Concealed Handgun Permit holders exercising their rights pursuant to Item #3 above are responsible for preventing the casual or inadvertent display of their handgun.

It shall not be an offense if the weapon remains inside a locked motor vehicle upon the real estate owned by the State Board for Community Colleges and Occupational Education.

In accordance with Colorado Statute CRS 18-12-214(3), under no circumstances may a person other than a certified peace officer carry a firearm or other equipment defined in Board Policy onto the real property, or into any improvements erected thereon, of a public elementary, middle, junior high, high school or college. In accordance with Colorado Statute CRS 18-12-214(3)(a), a concealed weapon permittee may have a handgun on the real property of the public school so long as the handgun remains in his or her vehicle and, if the permittee is not in the vehicle, the handgun is in a compartment within the vehicle and the vehicle is locked.

SEXUAL ASSAULT, SEXUAL HARASSMENT, CRIME PREVENTION EDUCATIONAL PROGRAMMING

Emily Griffith Technical College (EGTC) does not discriminate on the basis of sex in its educational programs and sexual harassment and sexual violence are types of sex discrimination. Other acts can also be forms of sex-based discrimination and are also prohibited whether sexually based or not and include dating violence, domestic violence, and stalking. As a result, EGTC issues a statement of policy to inform the community of our comprehensive plan addressing sexual misconduct, educational programs, and procedures that address sexual assault, domestic violence, dating violence, and stalking, whether the incident occurs on or off campus and when it is reported to a College official. In this context, EGTC prohibits the offenses of domestic violence, dating violence, sexual assault and stalking and reaffirms its commitment to maintain a campus environment emphasizing the dignity and worth of all members of the College community. DEFINITIONS

Consent, Unlawful Sexual Behavior - Colorado Revised Statutes (C.R.S.) 18-3-401, means cooperation in act or attitude pursuant to an exercise of free will and with knowledge of the nature of the act. A current or previous relationship shall not be sufficient to constitute consent. Submission under the influence of fear shall not constitute consent.

Sexual Assault - C.R.S. 18-3-402, Colorado law defines sexual assault as any actor who knowingly inflicts sexual intrusion or sexual penetration on a victim commits sexual assault if:

- The actor causes submission of the victim by means of sufficient consequence reasonably calculated to cause submission against the victim's will; or
- The actor knows that the victim is incapable of appraising the nature of the victim's conduct; or
- The actor knows that the victim submits erroneously, believing the actor to be the victim's spouse; or
- At the time of the commission of the act, the victim is less than fifteen years of age and the actor is at least four years older than the victim and is not the spouse of the victim; or
- At the time of the commission of the act, the victim is at least fifteen years of age but less than seventeen years of age and the actor is at least ten years older than the victim and is not the spouse of the victim; or
- The victim is in custody of law or detained in a hospital or other institution and the actor has supervisory or disciplinary authority over the victim and uses this position of authority to coerce the victim to submit, unless the act is incident to a lawful search; or
- The actor, while purporting to offer a medical service, engages in treatment or examination of a victim for other than a bona fide medical purpose or in a manner substantially inconsistent with reasonable medical practices; or
- The victim is physically helpless and the actor knows the victim is physically helpless and the victim has not consented.

Domestic Violence - C.R.S. 18-6-800.3 means an act or threatened act of violence upon a person with whom the actor is or has been involved in an intimate relationship. Domestic Violence also includes any other crime against a person, or against property, including an animal or any municipal ordinance violation against a person, or against property, including an animal, when used as a method of coercion, control, punishment, intimidation, or revenge directed against a person with whom the actor is or has been involved in an intimate relationship.

Dating Violence - There is no Colorado state law on dating violence; therefore the college abides by the definition used in the Violence Against Women Reauthorization Act (VAWA) of 2013. Dating Violence means violence committed by a person who is or has been in a social relationship of a romantic or intimate nature with the victim. The existence of such a relationship shall be determined based on the reporting party's statement and with consideration of the length of the relationship, the type of relationship, and the frequency of interaction between the persons involved in the relationship.

For purposes of this definition, dating violence includes, but is not limited to, sexual or physical abuse or the threat of such abuse. Dating violence does not include acts covered under the definition of domestic violence.

Stalking - C.R.S. 18-3-602, means a person commits stalking if directly, or indirectly through another person, the person knowingly:

- Makes a credible threat to another person and, in connection with the threat, repeatedly follows, approaches, contacts, or places under surveillance that person, a member of that person's immediate family, or someone with whom that person has or has had a continuing relationship; or
- Makes a credible threat to another person and, in connection with the threat, repeatedly makes any form of communication with that person, a member of that person's immediate family, or someone with whom that person has or has had a continuing relationship, regardless of whether a conversation ensues; or
- Repeatedly follows, approaches, contacts, places under surveillance, or makes any form of communication with another person, a member of that person's immediate family, or someone with whom that person has or has had a continuing relationship in a manner that would cause a reasonable person to suffer serious emotional distress and does cause that person, a member of that person's immediate family, or someone with whom that person has or has had a continuing relationship to suffer serious emotional distress. For purposes of this paragraph (c), a victim need not show that he or she received professional treatment or counseling to show that he or she suffered serious emotional distress.

Additional definitions as it relates to “Stalking” under Colorado law:

- Conduct "in connection with" a credible threat means acts that further, advance, promote, or have a continuity of purpose, and may occur before, during, or after the credible threat.
- "Credible threat" means a threat, physical action, or repeated conduct that would cause a reasonable person to be in fear for the person's safety or the safety of his or her immediate family or of someone with whom the person has or has had a continuing relationship. The threat need not be directly expressed if the totality of the conduct would cause a reasonable person such fear.
- "Immediate family" includes the person's spouse and the person's parent, grandparent, sibling, or child.
- "Repeated" or "repeatedly" means on more than one occasion.

Bystander Intervention – People assume that the more people there are around, the more likely it is that someone in trouble will receive help. Actually, the more people, the less likely it is that anyone will help. Bystander Intervention is the practice of taking action or intervening, when you see someone in need help. Bystanders should help out when they see someone in trouble; however, if they think doing so could be dangerous, they should call for help right away rather than engaging.

EDUCATION AND PREVENTION PROGRAMS

The College engages in comprehensive educational programming to prevent domestic violence, dating violence, sexual assault and stalking. Educational programming consists of primary prevention and awareness programs for all incoming students and new employees and ongoing awareness and prevention campaigns for students and faculty that:

- Identifies domestic violence, dating violence, sexual assault and stalking as prohibited conduct;
- Defines what behavior constitutes domestic violence, dating violence, sexual assault, and stalking;
- Defines what behavior and actions constitute consent to sexual activity in the State of Colorado;
- Provides safe and positive options for bystander intervention that may be carried out by an individual to prevent harm or intervene when there is a risk of domestic violence, dating violence, sexual assault, or stalking against a person other than the bystander.
- Provides information on risk reduction so that students and employees may recognize warning signs of abusive behavior and how to avoid potential attacks.
- Provides an overview of information contained in the Annual Security Report (ASR) in compliance with the Clery Act.

Educational programs are offered to raise awareness for all incoming students and employees, and are often conducted during new student and new employee orientation and throughout an incoming student’s first semester. These programs and others offered throughout the year include strong messages regarding not just awareness, but also primary prevention Bystander engagement is encouraged through safe and positive intervention techniques and by empowering third-party intervention and prevention such as calling for help, using intervention-based apps, identifying allies and/or creating distractions.

Programs also offer information on risk reduction that strives to empower victims, how to recognize warning signals and how to avoid potential attacks, and do so without victim-blaming approaches. Throughout the year, ongoing awareness and prevention campaigns are directed to students and employees, including faculty, often taking the form of emails, guest speakers, posters, flyers and informative meeting that distribute education material.

Crime prevention and awareness guidelines are presented in the DPS Emergency Preparedness Manual. Additional programs may be developed and presented in the future to EGTC and the Osage Campus after it opens.

PROCEDURES FOR REPORTING A COMPLAINT

EGTC has procedures in place that serve to be sensitive to those who report sexual assault, domestic violence, dating violence, and stalking, including informing individuals about their right to file criminal charges as well as the availability of medical, counseling and support services, and additional remedies to prevent contact between a complainant and an accused party, such academic, transportation and working accommodations, if reasonably available. After an incident of sexual assault or domestic violence, the victim should consider seeking medical attention as soon as possible. In Colorado, evidence may be collected even if the victim chooses not to make a report to law enforcement. It is important that a victim of sexual assault not bathe, douche, smoke, change clothing or clean the bed/linen/area where they were assaulted if the offense occurred within the past 96 hours so that evidence as may be necessary to the proof of criminal activity may be preserved. In circumstances of sexual assault, if victims do not opt for forensic evidence collection, health care providers can still treat injuries and take steps to address concerns of pregnancy and/or sexually transmitted disease. Victims of sexual assault, domestic violence, stalking, and dating violence are encouraged to also preserve evidence by saving text messages, instant messages, social networking pages, other communications, and keeping pictures, logs or other copies of documents, if they have any, that would be useful to College hearing boards/investigators or police. Although the College strongly encourages all members of its community to report violations of this policy to law enforcement, it is the victim's choice whether or not to make such a report and victims have the right to decline involvement with the police. EGTC's Security Department will assist any victim with notifying local police if they so desire. Denver Police Department may also be reached directly by calling (720-913-2800) or 911 or in person

If you have been the victim of domestic violence, dating violence, sexual assault, or stalking, you should report the incident promptly to the Title IX Coordinator at 720-423-4735 located at 1860 Lincoln Street, Denver, CO room 618 and Campus Police/Security (if the victim so desires.)

The Title IX Coordinator is ultimately responsible to assure in all cases that the behavior is brought to an end, and that EGTC acts to reasonably prevent its recurrence and the effects on the victim and the community are remedied. The Coordinator is also responsible to assure that training is conducted annually for all investigators that protects the safety of victims and promotes accountability. Training will focus on sexual misconduct, domestic violence, dating violence, sexual assault, stalking, sexual harassment, retaliation and other behaviors that can be forms of sex or gender discrimination covered by Title IX and Clery Act. Training will help those decision-makers in the process to protect the safety of victims and to promote accountability for those who commit offenses.

The College will provide resources to persons who have been victims of sexual assault, domestic violence, dating violence, or stalking, and will apply appropriate disciplinary procedures to those who violate this policy. The procedures set forth below are intended to afford a prompt response to charges of sexual assault, domestic or dating violence, and stalking, to maintain confidentiality and fairness consistent with applicable legal requirements, and to impose appropriate sanctions on violators of this policy.

As time passes, evidence may dissipate or become lost or unavailable, thereby making investigation, possible prosecution, disciplinary proceedings, or obtaining protection from abuse orders related to the incident more difficult. If a victim chooses not to make a complaint regarding an incident, he or she nevertheless should consider speaking with Campus Security or other law enforcement to preserve evidence in the event that the victim changes her/his mind at a later date.

If a report of domestic violence, dating violence, sexual assault or stalking is reported to the College, the below are the procedures that the College will follow as well as a statement of the standard of evidence that will be used during any judicial hearing on campus arising from such a report:

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ASSISTANCE FOR VICTIMS: RIGHTS & OPTIONS

Regardless of whether a victim elects to pursue a criminal complaint, the College will assist victims of sexual assault, domestic violence, dating violence, and stalking and will provide each victim with a written explanation of their rights. When charges are filed and an investigation is launched, Denver Police have a Victim's Advocate branch and they will follow-up with victims of crime. In Colorado, a victim of domestic violence, dating violence, sexual assault or stalking has the following rights:

Rights Afforded to Victims-C.R.S. 24-4.1-302.5 In order to preserve and protect a victim's rights to justice and due process, each victim of a crime shall have the following rights:

- The right to be treated with fairness, respect, and dignity, and to be free from intimidation, harassment, or abuse, throughout the criminal justice process;
- The right to be informed of, be present or not present, and without submitting a written request for notification, for all critical stages of the criminal justice process as specified in state statute (C.R.S. 24-4.1-302(2));
- The right to be informed of the filing of a petition by a perpetrator of the offense to terminate sex offender registration pursuant to section 16-22-113(2)(c), C.R.S.;

- The right to be informed, upon request by the victim, when a person who is accused or convicted of a crime against the victim is released or discharged from county jail; and
- The right to be informed, upon written request by the victim, when a person who is accused or convicted of a crime against the victim is released or discharged from custody other than county jail, is paroled, escapes from a secure or non-secure correctional facility or program, or absconds from probation or parole.

Further, EGTC complies with Colorado law in recognizing orders of protection by working with the Title IX Coordinator and Campus Security in developing a Safety Action Plan, which is a plan for the victim to reduce risk of harm while on campus or coming and going from campus. This plan may include but is not limited to: escorts, special parking arrangements, changing classroom location or allowing a student to complete assignments from home, etc.

Any county or district court shall have the authority to enter an emergency protection order, which may include:

- Restraining a party from contacting, harassing, injuring, intimidating, threatening, molesting, touching, stalking, sexually assaulting or abusing any other party, a minor child of either of the parties, or a minor child who is in danger in the reasonably foreseeable future of being a victim of an unlawful sexual offense or domestic abuse;
- Excluding a party from the family home or from the home of another party upon a showing that physical or emotional harm would otherwise result;
- Awarding temporary care and control of any minor child of a party involved;
- Enjoining an individual from contacting a minor child at school, at work, or wherever he or she may be found;
- Restraining a party from molesting, injuring, killing, taking, transferring, encumbering, concealing, disposing of or threatening harm to an animal owned, possessed, leased, kept, or held by any other party, a minor child of either of the parties, or an elderly or at-risk adult; or
- Specifying arrangements for possession and care of an animal owned, possessed, leased, kept, or held by any other party, a minor child of either of the parties, or an elderly or at-risk adult.

In cases involving a minor child, (under age 18) the juvenile court and the district court shall have the authority to issue emergency protection orders to prevent an unlawful sexual offense, or to prevent domestic abuse, when requested by the local law enforcement agency, the county department of social services, or a responsible person who asserts, in a verified petition supported by affidavit, that there are reasonable grounds to believe that a minor child is in danger in the reasonably foreseeable future of being the victim of an unlawful sexual offense or domestic abuse, based upon an allegation of a recent actual unlawful sexual offense or domestic abuse or threat of the same. Any emergency protection order issued shall be on a standardized form prescribed by the judicial department and a copy shall be provided to the protected person.

A verbal emergency protection order may be issued only if the issuing judge finds that an imminent danger in close proximity exists to the life or health of one or more persons or that a danger exists to the life or health of the minor child in the reasonably foreseeable future.

To the extent of the victim’s cooperation and consent, College offices, including Human Resources or Student Services will work cooperatively to ensure that the complainant's health, physical safety, work and academic status are protected, pending the outcome of a formal College investigation of the complaint. For example, if reasonably available, a complainant may be offered changes to academic or working situations in addition to counseling, health services and assistance in notifying appropriate local law enforcement. Additionally, personal identifiable information about the victim will be treated as confidential and only shared with persons with a specific need to know who are investigating/adjudicating the complaint or delivering resources or support services to the complainant. The College does not publish the name of crime victims nor house identifiable information regarding victims in the Campus Security Daily Crime Log or online. Victims may request that directory information on file be removed from public sources by a request through Human Resources.

CONFIDENTIALITY

The College will protect the identity of persons who report having been victims of sexual assault, domestic violence, dating violence, or stalking to the fullest extent of the law.

SANCTIONS AND PROTECTIVE MEASURES

In all cases, investigations that result in a finding of more likely than not that a violation(s) has occurred may lead to the initiation of disciplinary procedures against the accused individual. Examples of college sanctions may include, but are not limited to:

- For students-warning, probation, fines, restitution, denial of privileges, assignment to perform services for the benefit of the college or community, suspension, expulsion, or “No trespass” directive.
- For EGTC employees-warning, written warning, corrective actions, probation, restitution, denial of privileges, suspension, termination of employment, or “No trespass” directive (PNG).
- For authorized volunteers, guest(s), or visitors-warning, writing warning, denial of privileges, dismissal from college, or “No trespass” directive.
-

For students, sexual assault, domestic violence, dating violence, and stalking are violations of the Student Conduct Code. Employees who violate this policy will be subject to discipline, up to and including termination of employment. Sexual assault, domestic violence, dating violence, and stalking are criminal acts which also may subject the perpetrator to criminal and civil penalties under federal and state law.

The Title IX Coordinator will determine whether interim interventions and protective measure should be implemented, and, if so, take steps to implement those protective measures as soon as possible. Examples of interim protective measures include, but are not limited to: an order of no contact, adjustment of course schedules, a leave of absence, or reassignment to a different supervisor or position. These remedies may be applied to one, both, or multiple parties involved. Violations of the Title IX Coordinator’s directives and/or protective measures will constitute related violations that may lead to additional disciplinary action. Protective measures imposed may be temporary pending the results of an investigation or may become permanent as determined by Human Resources and Campus Security.

SEX OFFENDER REGISTRATION

In accordance to the Campus Sex Crimes Prevention Act of 2000, which amends the Jacob Wetterling Crimes Against Children and Sexually Violent Offender Registration Act, the Jeanne Clery Act and the Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act of 1974, the College is providing a link to the Colorado State Sex Offender Registry. All sex offenders are required to register in the state of Colorado and to provide notice of each institution of higher education in Colorado at which the person is employed, carries a vocation or is a student. In Colorado, convicted sex offenders must register with the Colorado Bureau of Investigation (CBI). The Colorado sex offender website is <https://www.colorado.gov/apps/cdps/sor/>.

PROHIBITION ON RETALIATION

An institution, or an officer, employee, or agent of an institution, may not retaliate, intimidate, threaten, coerce, or otherwise discriminate against any individual for exercising their rights or responsibilities under any provision in this policy.

STUDENT CODE OF CONDUCT

EGTC wishes to provide a school environment that is safe, conducive to learning, and free from unnecessary disruption. Behavior that is detrimental to the welfare or safety of other students or school personnel, and which interferes with the school's ability to provide educational opportunities to other students will be considered inappropriate.

Students found to be in violation of the Student Code of Conduct will be removed from class until such time as the instructor and supervising administrator determine appropriate disciplinary action. The following violations will result in appropriate disciplinary action including removal from school, return under contract, or immediate expulsion:

- Using violent behavior or the threat of violent behavior toward employees, students or the general public will not be tolerated.
 - Possessing any firearm, ammunition, explosive device, or illegal weapon as defined by Colorado law.
 - Fighting, assault, threat of bodily harm, or sexual harassment.
 - Engaging in verbal abuse, intimidation, or harassment of instructors, students, or staff.
 - Failing to comply with verbal or written directions of individuals in authority.
 - Engaging in distribution, possession, use, or being under the influence of alcohol, marijuana, an illegal drug, or controlled substances as defined in section 12-22-303, Colorado Revised Statutes.
 - Participating in gang-related activities and such gang-related characteristics as colors, hand signs, graffiti, apparel, jewelry, notebooks, trademarks, and any other attributes denoting gang affiliation.
 - Destroying, defacing, or stealing of school property or property of others.
 - Being dishonest, cheating, plagiarizing or knowingly furnishing false information.
 - Forging, altering, or misusing of school documents, records, identification materials, educational materials, and Internet access.
 - Using obscenities or vulgarities.
 - Gambling, wagering, or betting of any type, either on or about the premises.
 - Participating in unauthorized entry or use of school facilities and/or equipment.
 - Engaging in unauthorized distribution or sale of goods or unauthorized postings of materials on school bulletin boards or building surfaces.
 - Failing to comply with contractual obligations with Emily Griffith Technical College (tuition payments, terms of work study or employment).
 - Engaging in unacceptable uses of school-owned equipment and resource materials.
 - Smoking in any of the Emily Griffith Technical College buildings, shops, or on EGTC property.
 - Consuming food or drink brought to or consumed in the classroom without instructor consent.
 - Parking of any two-wheel vehicle in the facility.
 - Bringing children to class or leaving children unattended or unsupervised on school property or grounds.
 - Bringing animals or pets of any type in the building. (Exception: service animals.)
 - Inviting friends to the campus. Visitor passes are issued only for potential students to meet with the counselors or to visit classes.
 - Using headphones, cellular phone, pagers, or any similar form of electronic device during class.
 - Displaying any form of dress that is determined to be disruptive to the educational process which includes wearing shorts, halters, or other garments that expose the body.
 - Violating other conduct policies as stated in the Denver Public Schools' Student Conduct and Discipline Policy or other appropriate policies developed within individual classrooms or programs.
- These policies were developed to provide an optimum learning environment for all.

All students are required to adhere to the Student Code of Conduct at all times and will sign off stating they received a copy of the Code of Conduct and understand what constitutes a violation.

STUDENT CONDUCT

The first contact for the aggrieved student will be through verbal conversation with his or her instructor. If the student is not satisfied with the outcome of the conversation, the following formal steps will be taken:

Step 1 In the event that the aggrieved student is not satisfied with the decision from the verbal conversation. The aggrieved student may submit a formal letter of explanation to the Instructional Dean of the program. The Instructional Dean of the program will meet with the aggrieved student within five school days of receipt of the letter in an attempt to resolve the issue.

Step 2 If the decision of the does not satisfy the aggrieved student, he or she may request that the letter be forwarded to the Executive Assistant for Instructional Programs. The grievance will be forwarded to either the Director of Instructional Programs of the Director of Student Services depending on circumstances. Within five school days of receipt of the letter, the Director will meet with the student to attempt to resolve the grievance.

Step 3 In the event that the aggrieved student is still not satisfied with the decision made in Step 3, he or she may file a second appeal in the form of a formal letter to the Executive Director. Within ten school days of receipt of the letter, the Executive Director will meet with the student.

Step 4 In the event that the aggrieved student is not satisfied with the decision made by the Executive director, he or she will be advised to contact the appropriate director at the Denver Public Schools' Central Administration Offices at 1860 Lincoln Street, Denver, CO 80203.

CRIME PREVENTION PROGRAMS

Security and Safety Awareness Campaign

This program is designed to make the campus community aware of campus crime and provide information on reporting and implementing self-security to reduce overall campus crime. Self-help tips and reporting information is provided through posters.

Campus Escort Program

The Security department provides free escort service available to all students, faculty, and staff. This service is available every day of the fall, spring and summer semesters, except for school holidays. Call 303-423-3344 to request an escort. All employees undergo a background check before being hired as security officers/escort. Administrative Security does provide escort after 8:00 pm when the Main Entrance doors lock. Other times vary with Officer availability but escorts can be provided most of the time when called upon.

Crime Stoppers

This program allows members of the campus community to call a special phone line (which is not recorded and does not have caller ID) and provide information about a crime or suspect. The caller remains anonymous, but if

the information received leads to an arrest, the caller may be entitled to an award of up to \$2000. If you have information about a crime or suspect, call 720-913-STOP (7867).

Video Surveillance

Video cameras are located in various areas throughout the campus.

EMERGENCY CONTACT SERVICES

Director of Student Services will serve as the primary referral point for students who need to be contacted due to an emergency. Although any campus personnel are free to deliver emergency messages to students when expedient, the Executive Director or Director of Student Services would like to be informed in order to assure appropriate follow up and documentation. Determining messaging for "emergencies" while students are in class will be handled on a case by case basis. It is important to note that we cannot guarantee contact with any student due to their highly mobile behavior, but a good faith effort will be made. Keep in mind that we will not become a messaging service for non-emergent situations. Depending on the type of emergency, a message will be delivered to the faculty member or work supervisor asking for the student to be dismissed and to:

1. Immediately contact the source of the message or;
2. Immediately proceed to the Director of Student Services office for pertinent information.

ALCOHOL AND DRUG POLICY

In the State of Colorado, it is illegal for any person under the age of twenty-one years to possess, consume, or purchase any alcoholic beverage. Any person under twenty-one years of age who possesses or consumes an alcoholic beverage anywhere in the state commits a crime. Anyone over the age of twenty-one commits a crime if they provide an alcoholic beverage to an underage person. EGTC prohibits the possession of alcoholic beverages or marijuana on campus at any time. The State of Colorado prohibits the unlawful manufacture, distribution, sale, possession or use of drugs or controlled substances. The Denver Police Departments has the authority to enforce all federal, state, and local laws and official college policies. As a public institution and state agency, EGTC expects all members of the college community to be responsible for their own behavior within the context of federal and state law and college regulations.

ALCOHOL AND DRUG ABUSE PREVENTION PROGRAM

Emily Griffith Technical College is an area career/technical school governed by the Denver Public Schools (DPS) Board of Education and by regulations established by the Colorado Community College System. These DPS Board policies require the school to comply with the Drug Free Schools and Communities Amendments of 1989 (PL 101-226 in federal law). The school has adopted the following Drug and Alcohol Abuse Prevention Program:

I. STANDARD OF CONDUCT

Students and employees shall not engage in the unauthorized or unlawful manufacture, distribution, dispensing, possession, use or abuse of alcohol, marijuana and/or illicit drugs on school property or used as a part of school activities.

II. LEGAL SANCTIONS FOR VIOLATIONS OF THE STANDARDS OF CONDUCT

Any student or employee who is convicted of the unlawful manufacture, distribution, dispensation, possession, use/abuse of illicit drugs, and/or alcohol is subject to criminal penalties under local, state, and federal law. These penalties range in severity from a fine of up to \$100 to life imprisonment and/or a fine of \$8,000,000. The exact penalty assessed depends upon the nature and severity of the individual offense.

III. PENALTIES WHICH MAY BE IMPOSED BY THE SCHOOL

Students and/or employees who violate the above standard of conduct will be subject to disciplinary action under employee and student disciplinary policies. The sanctions include, but are not limited to, a requirement to complete an appropriate rehabilitation or re-entry program, expulsion from school or termination of employment, and/or referral to authorities for prosecution.

IV. HEALTH RISKS ASSOCIATED WITH THE USE OF ILLICIT DRUGS AND ALCOHOL ABUSE

Health risks associated with drug and alcohol abuse include, but are not limited to malnutrition, brain damage, heart disease, pancreatitis, cirrhosis of the liver, mental illness, death, and low birth weight babies with drug addictions.

V. AVAILABLE COUNSELING, TREATMENT, REHABILITATION OR RE-ENTRY PROGRAMS

Information on available counseling, treatment, and rehabilitation or re-entry programs is available at the school counseling office or the Colorado Department of Health. Emily Griffith Technical College security and/or the Emily Griffith High School Principal and/or a Director of Emily Griffith Technical College will handle violations of this policy. For assistance, call Security at 720-833-1703.

SMOKING

The State of Colorado has a smoke free building policy and EGTC is also Tobacco free Campus. If you want to use tobacco products you can only do so in designated areas, which would be more than fifty (50) feet away from the doorways/entrances to buildings.

CRIME LOCATIONS

On Campus – Any building or property owned or controlled by an institution within the same reasonably contiguous geographic area and used by the institution in direct support of, or in a manner related to, the institution’s educational purposes.

Public Property – All public property, including thoroughfares, streets, sidewalks, and parking facilities, that is within the campus, or immediately adjacent to and accessible from the campus. Note: Include sidewalks and streets surrounding the campus as well as the sidewalk across the street from campus, but do not include public property beyond the sidewalk.

CRIME DEFINITIONS

Murder/Non-Negligent Manslaughter: The willful (non-negligent) killing of one human being by another. NOTE: Deaths caused by negligence, attempts to kill, assaults to kill, suicides, accidental deaths, and justifiable homicides are excluded.

Negligent Manslaughter: The killing of another person through gross negligence.

Sex Offenses – Forcible: Any sexual act directed against another person, forcibly and/or against that person's will; or not forcibly or against the person's will where the victim is incapable of giving consent.

Sex Offenses – Non-forcible: Unlawful, non-forcible sexual intercourse. This includes incest and statutory rape.

Robbery: The taking or attempting to take anything from value of the care, custody or control of a person or persons by force or threat of force or violence and/or by putting the victim in fear.

Aggravated Assault: An unlawful attack by one person upon another for the purpose of inflicting severe or aggravated bodily injury. This type of assault usually is accompanied by the use of a weapon or by means likely to produce death or great bodily harm. It is not necessary that injury result from an aggravated assault when a gun, knife or other weapon is used which could or probably would result in a serious potential injury if the crime were successfully completed.

Burglary: The unlawful entry of a structure to commit a felony or a theft. For reporting purposes this definition includes: unlawful entry with intent to commit a larceny or felony; breaking and entering with intent to commit a larceny; housebreaking; safecracking; and all attempts to commit any of the aforementioned.

Motor Vehicle Theft: The theft or attempted theft of a motor vehicle. (Classify as motor vehicle theft all cases where automobiles are taken by persons not having lawful access, even though the vehicles are later abandoned including joyriding)

Arson: The willful or malicious burning or attempt to burn, with or without intent to defraud, a dwelling house, public building, motor vehicle or aircraft, or personal property of another kind.

Weapon Law Violations: The violation of laws or ordinances dealing with weapon offenses, regulatory in nature, such as: manufacture, sale, or possession of deadly weapons; carrying deadly weapons, concealed or openly; furnishing deadly weapons to minors; aliens possessing deadly weapons; all attempts to commit any of the aforementioned.

Drug Abuse Violations: Violations of state and local laws relating to the unlawful possession, sale, use, growing, manufacturing, and making of narcotic drugs. The relevant substances include: opium or cocaine and their derivatives (morphine, heroin, codeine); marijuana; synthetic narcotics (Demerol, methadone); and dangerous non-narcotic drugs (barbiturates, Benzedrine).

Liquor Law Violations: The violation of laws or ordinance prohibiting: the manufacture, sale, transporting, furnishing, possessing of intoxicating liquor; maintaining unlawful drinking places; bootlegging; operating a still; furnishing liquor to minor or intemperate person; using a vehicle for illegal transportation of liquor; drinking on a train or public conveyance; all attempts to commit any of the aforementioned. (Drunkenness and driving under the influence are not included in this definition.)

Rape: The penetration, no matter how slight, of the vagina or anus with any body part or object, or oral penetration by a sex organ of another person, without the consent of the victim.

Fondling: The touching of the private body parts of another person for the purpose of sexual gratification, without the consent of the victim, including instances where the victim is incapable of giving consent because of his/her age or because of his/her temporary or permanent mental incapacity.

Incest: Sexual intercourse between persons who are related to each other within the degrees wherein marriage is prohibited by law.

Statutory Rape: Sexual intercourse with a person who is under the statutory age of consent.

Hate Crimes: If the victim is intentionally selected because of the victim’s actual or perceived: race, gender, religion, national origin, sexual orientation, gender identity, ethnicity, or disability.

Unfounded Crimes: An institution must report to the DOE and disclose in its ASR statistics the total number of crime reports that were “unfounded” and subsequently withheld from its crime statistics during each of the three most recent calendar years.
